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## **WOOD COUNTY SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT DISTRICT** **POLICY COMMITTEE MEETING** **August 14, 2017**

The Wood County Solid Waste Management District Policy Committee met on the 14<sup>th</sup> day of August 2017. Commissioner Doris Herringshaw called the meeting to order at 2:00 p.m. The following members were present: Commissioner Herringshaw, Joe Fawcett (proxy for Mayor Dick Edwards), Lana Glore, Nicki Kale, Judy Hagen, Lori Carson, and Jim Rossow. Additional persons were in attendance as listed on the attached roster. The Agenda was as follows:

- I. *Approval of May 1, 2017 Meeting Minutes.* Judy Hagen moved that the minutes be approved and Lori Carson seconded the motion. All members present voted aye and the motion carried.

- II. *Solid Waste Management District Update:* Assistant County Administrator Kelly O'Boyle reported on the following:

*2016 Annual District Report Submitted:* Ms. O'Boyle gave an overview of the report and stated it was submitted before the June 1 deadline. The combined total for commercial and residential was 32,000 tons.

*Solid Waste Management District Quarterly Electronic Newsletter Distributed:* The first newsletter was distributed on July 28 to 178 people; 72 people opened it. Anyone wanting to be added to the list can contact the District. The link is also available on the District's website.

*Tire Amnesty Event Update:* The collection event will be on September 30 from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. in the Wood County Fair parking lot on Poe Road. It is not open to businesses and there is a 10 tire (passenger and light truck only) per vehicle limit for residents of Wood County only; proof of residency is required. Advertisement billboards are located on Route 25, one south of Roachton Road and one at Kramer Road. Two deputies from the Sheriff's Department will be present to direct traffic. The City of Bowling Green has offered use of their electronic traffic signs. This is funded through the 2017 Ohio EPA Tire Amnesty Grant totaling \$25,000.00 with a 10% match of \$2,500.00.

*Glass Update:* Ms. O'Boyle asked Bill DenBesten, Chairman of the Bowling Green Recycling Center Committee, to present proposals for glass recycling by the Center, originally submitted to Ms. O'Boyle earlier on August 14. Four proposals, with differences highlighted, were presented (attached).

Discussions regarding the proposal took place. Commissioner Herringshaw stated the Committee wants to reinstate glass recycling, however, additional review of the options should take place before making a final decision.

*June 2017 Financials:* Patti Bowsher presented a report comparing the District's 2013-2017 June year-to-date revenue, expenses, and cash balance (attached).

*Presentation of Proposed Permanent Drop-Off Pilot:* Ms. O'Boyle began her presentation stating this proposal was presented to the Board of County Commissioners on July 13 for information only with the understanding that this would be presented to the Policy Committee at this meeting to receive members' feedback which would be taken back to the Commissioners for further discussion (a printed version of the power point presentation is attached).

Discussion regarding the presentation took place regarding the proposed locations, infrastructure, usage, cost, per capita payments, and communication of the pilot to the jurisdictions.

Mr. Fawcett stated he felt comfortable moving forward with the pilot program. Mr. Fawcett made a motion to approve moving forward with the pilot study for the County's residential satellite recycling program. Ms. Carson seconded, all members present voted aye, motion carried. Ms. O'Boyle will keep the Committee informed of future developments.

*Expiration of Two-Year Term Members:* Mr. Fawcett made a motion for Nicki Kale, Judy Hagen, and Lori Carson to be reappointed for another term. Mr. Rossow seconded, all permanent committee members voted aye, motion carried.

III. *Education & Awareness:* Ms. Gamby reported statistics from the Wood County Fair: an 82% increase in attendance at The Grove and Phoenix Technologies reported just shy of a ton of plastic and aluminum was recycled. The District has developed a new edition of its Household Recycling Directory, moving from a booklet format to a full page double-sided brochure directing readers to the District's website for the full listing, which allows for quick and easy updates.

IV. *Landfill/Recycling Updates:* Mr. Hennessy reported that BGSU students will be moving in on Thursday and Sunday of this coming week. They are partnering again this year with the Black Swamp Arts Festival September 8-10; recycling clear stream containers will be placed throughout. Green Game Day program activities will continue this year, partnering with BGSU athletics to offer recycling in the tailgate area and the interior of the stadium. Massive educational promotions take place this time of the year to bring new students on board with on-campus and off-campus recycling.

Ms. Hagen reported the new Hull Prairie Intermediate School opens on August 15. With discontinuation of the annual Recycle Roundup program, recycling of small electronics is now available at the Roachton road complex and the City continues to work with Environmental Recycling located in Bowling Green for household hazardous waste recycling.

Mr. Fawcett reported Bowling Green will be doing a staff walk this week in the Courthouse neighborhood and the second ward to try to help curb some of the residual issues the City is having with trash contamination in the curbside recycling collection. Trash violations are tracked and notification stickers are placed over the recycling container lid at that particular residence. Mr. Hennessy commented this year BGSU has rented five apartment complexes off-campus which are considered residence halls; they are located on North Enterprise and East Merry Streets. Those tenants will be supplied with recycling education materials provided by the University.

Ms. Carson reiterated Ms. Gamby's earlier comments that Phoenix Technologies processed the materials collected at the Fair. August will be the first month that Phoenix will be operating at full capacity since opening the new location which results in 100 million pounds recycled. Ms. Kale reported on September 16 the Wood Soil & Water Conservation District will be holding its annual meeting and ATV tour of various locations throughout Wood County, including Renewed Outdoors and Ag Incubator. Ms. Hagen added that Perrysburg is now using Renewed Outdoors as its drop-off for compost; extended hours are offered there which has been beneficial to residents. Ms. Glore reported the Health Department has been busy with inspections due to the norovirus outbreak at a few local bakeries and also dumps with standing water and presence of mosquitos. Mr. Rossow stated he had just been at the Wood County Landfill this morning to inspect the leachate tanks, all required standards were met.

V. *Other Business:* None.

VI. *Next Meeting:* Monday, November 13, 2017 @ 2:00 p.m.

VII. *Adjournment:* Commissioner Herringshaw made a motion to adjourn the meeting and Nicki Kale seconded. All members present voted aye, meeting adjourned at 3:05 p.m.

One month ago, Glass recycling was discontinued in Bowling Green and Wood County due to unfavorable finances. Since then, discussions have occurred between Owens-Illinois, the Bowling Green Recycling Center, the City of Bowling Green and Wood County. All parties have expressed an interest in resuming glass recycling, provided that the finances can be made to work. With this in mind, the Bowling Green Recycling Center offers the following proposal.

## Proposal A -- Flat rate.

This proposal focuses on keeping the logistics and finances as simple as possible for all involved parties.

The Recycling Center will:

1. Accept glass in our dropoff and (at the county's option) the satellites.
2. Ensure glass remains at our historic contamination levels (at the time it leaves our property).
3. Load glass into the existing 30 yard rollofs.
4. Ensure that shipments are balanced and weight-legal.
5. Provide appropriate shipping documents to the driver.
6. Schedule shipments with both the transport and glass processing companies.
7. Be responsible for all payables to the hauler and receivables from the glass processor.

The County will:

1. Pay the Recycling Center \$1400.00 per month for its services.

If this proposal is accepted, the following terms will apply:

- The effective date of the agreement is from August 14, 2017 until December 31, 2018.
- In or about August 2018, the Recycling Center will submit an updated proposal.
- The first month of the agreement will be prorated, based on the date in which glass recycling is resumed.



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## **Proposal B -- Shipping subsidy.**

This proposal focuses on keeping the overall costs as low as possible, sharing the both risk and reward with the County. It closely mirrors our prior plan.

The Recycling Center will:

1. Accept glass in our dropoff and (at the county's option) the satellites.
2. Ensure glass remains at our historic contamination levels (at the time it leaves our property).
3. Load glass into the existing 30 yard rollofs.
4. Ensure that shipments are balanced and weight-legal.
5. Provide appropriate shipping documents to the driver.
6. Schedule shipments with both the transport and glass processing companies.
7. Be responsible for all receivables from the glass processor.

The County will:

1. Be responsible for all payables to the hauler, who will invoice the County directly.

If this proposal is accepted, the following terms will apply:

- Either party may upon 120-day notice to the other party, cancel this agreement.
- Either party may upon concurrence of the other party, select a different hauler.



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## **Proposal C -- City loads glass plus flat rate.**

This proposal focuses on keeping the finances as simple as possible for all involved parties while leveraging the City's offer to load glass at no charge to minimize costs. This works because their loader is tall enough to load trailers that do not require an empty backhaul.

The Recycling Center will:

1. Accept glass in our dropoff and (at the county's option) the satellites.
2. Ensure glass remains at our historic contamination levels (at the time it leaves our property).
3. Store glass in the City's old salt shed between shipments.
4. Schedule shipments with both the transport and glass processing companies.
5. In cooperation with the City, ensure that shipments are balanced and weight-legal.
6. Provide appropriate shipping documents to the driver.
7. Be responsible for all payables to the hauler and receivables from the glass processor.

The City will:

1. Load glass into hauler-supplied top-load, end-dump trailers.
2. In cooperation with the Recycling Center, adjust loads to ensure that shipments are balanced and weight-legal.

The County will:

1. Pay the Recycling Center \$800.00 per month for its services.

If this proposal is accepted, the following terms will apply:

- The effective date of the agreement is from August 14, 2017 until December 31, 2018.
- In or about August 2018, the Recycling Center will submit an updated proposal.
- The first month of the agreement will be prorated, based on the date in which glass recycling is resumed.

The Recycling Center will:

1. Accept glass in our dropoff and (at the county's option) the satellites.
2. Ensure glass remains at our historic contamination levels (at the time it leaves our property).
3. Store glass in the City's old salt shed between shipments.
4. Schedule shipments with both the transport and glass processing companies.
5. In cooperation with the City, ensure that shipments are balanced and weight-legal.
6. Provide appropriate shipping documents to the driver.
7. Be responsible for all receivables from the glass processor.

The City will:

1. Load glass into hauler-supplied top-load, end-dump trailers.
2. In cooperation with the Recycling Center, adjust loads to ensure that shipments are balanced and weight-legal.

The County will:

1. Be responsible for all payables to the hauler, who will invoice the County directly.

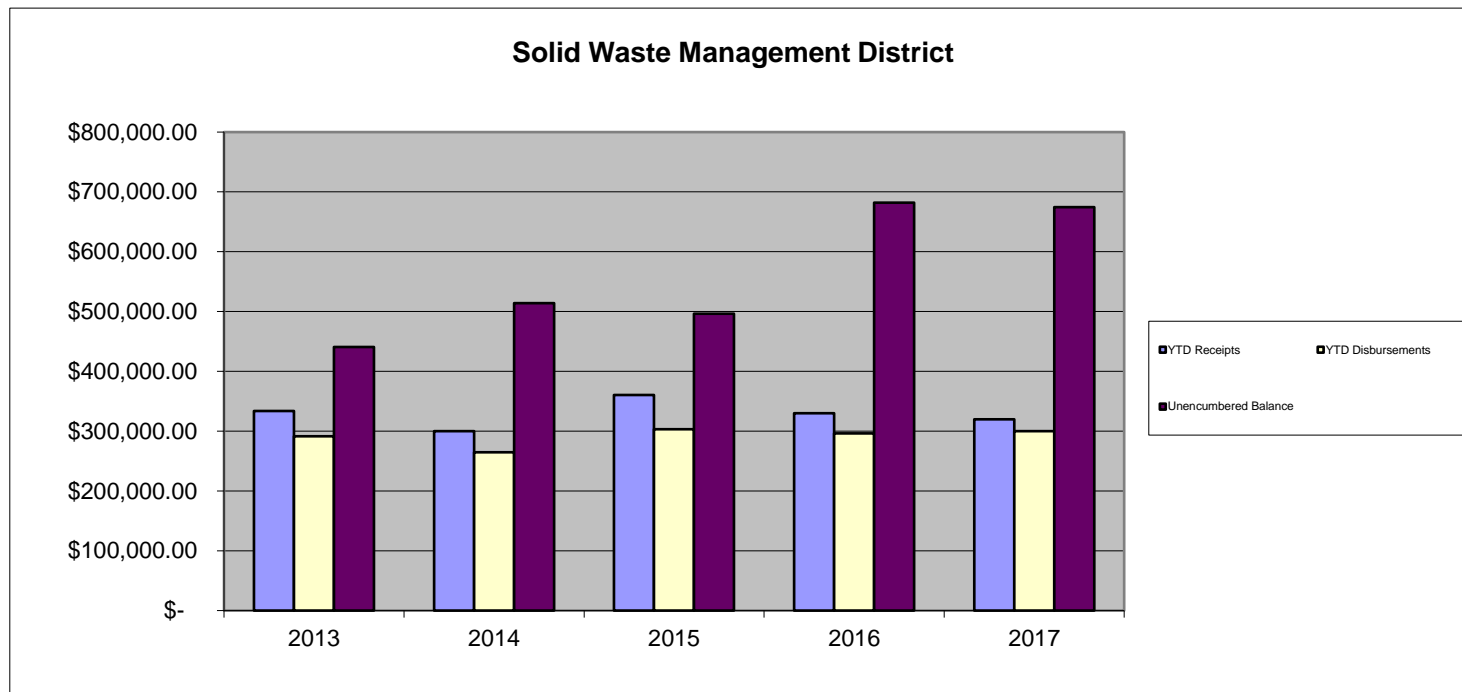

# BGSU Master's of Public Administration Study

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- In 2015, the Wood County Solid Waste Management District (WCSWMD), in partnership with Bowling Green State University (BGSU) Master's of Public Administration program, was interested in finding out more about recycling in rural Wood County.
- Rural residents were sent a survey in the mail regarding recycling in their community. A total of 2,725 surveys were mailed to rural residents of which 683 were completed and returned for analysis. The actual response rate less the returned surveys was 28% (288 of the surveys mailed were returned to the sender).
- Results showed how rural residents used the existing recycling services available to them.



# BGSU Master's of Public Administration Study (*Continued*)

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## *Highlights from Study-*

- Rural residents had a highly favorable attitude toward recycling.
- A number of survey respondents stated that they drive into Hancock and Lucas counties to use permanent recycling facilities.
- Of the respondents that used the satellite locations, 55% of them responded that they would increase utilization beyond once a month if permanent sites were made available.

# BGSU Master's of Public Administration Study

## *(Continued)*

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- Preferable travel time to a permanent location, if available, was between 5-15 minutes from their residence.

### ***Recommendations from the Study -***

- More marketing of the satellite locations through a rebranding of the recycling program was suggested based on responses received
- Better signage at the satellite locations to direct residents
- Preferred recommendation – if permanent locations implemented, then reduce the number of sites from the current 15 to 7 based on utilization/population



# BGSU Master's of Public Administration Study

## *(Continued)*

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- The seven suggested sites identified in the study were North Baltimore, Grand Rapids, Pemberville/Stony Ridge, Fostoria, Portage (P.O. Box Location), Perrysburg and Custar.
- The seven suggested sites to eliminate identified in the study were Bradner, Bloomdale, Rudolph, Portage (Merrill Rd location), Tontagony, Weston and Hoytville due to low tonnage and/or location.
- The study suggested to create the Pemberville/Stony Ridge site listed above.



# Steps taken from Study

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- The WCSWMD based on direction of the Board of Directors and Policy Committee rebranded the recycling information. A new, easier to utilize website was created along with more marketing materials to better spread the recycling message throughout the county.

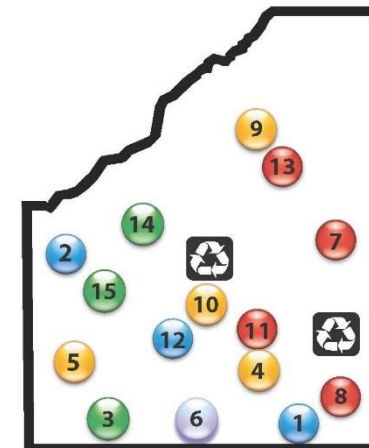

## Current Satellite Locations (*Continued*)

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- Monthly, mobile containers are placed at each of the satellite locations for residents to bring their recyclables. The containers remain at each location for a maximum of 2 days but are only accessible during the collection hours.
- Recyclables are separated at most of the sites by scouts and other groups paid through the participating jurisdiction's per capita allocation
- Contract with Bowling Green Recycling Center (BGRC) for the maintenance of the locations, including transporting the materials to the BGRC. The 2017 contract amount is \$7,200/month or \$86,400 for the year and expires in December 2017.
- Per Capita allocation to jurisdictions for recycling is roughly \$127K per year.



# Permanent Locations

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- Provide more access and convenience
- Promote more recycling due to not having to store recyclables in house or garage for a month
- Increase our residential participation numbers to align with the Ohio EPA's recommendations

***Items to discuss*** – location of sites, who maintains sites, adequate lighting for safety during early morning and night usage, cameras for contamination/illegal dumping, new role for scouts and other groups, future of per capita allocations

# Assumptions for Estimated Cost for Permanent Locations

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- 10 locations for permanent recycling containers
- Estimating 17 recycling containers based on 2016 recycling statistics (not including Southeast Wood County-NAT operates)– County owns containers
- Recycling container is 8 yd. at estimated cost of \$1,600/unit includes shipping
- Containers used for mixed recycling
- Pull cost is estimated at \$45/pull (hopefully on high side)– assumes 7 containers pulled 2 times per month and 10 containers 4 times per month – could be different based on usage
- Material collection cost is estimated at \$40/ton – used tonnage from 2016 statistics



# Estimated Cost for Permanent Locations

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Estimate based on *mixed recyclable collection only* at 10 locations:

- Estimated cost of Containers (17 based on possible locations and 2016 statistics for pounds recycled) = \$27,200
- Estimated cost for pulls (assumes 10 containers- 4 times/month and 7 containers-2 times/month @ \$45/pull )= \$29,160
- Estimated material cost (used 206 tons @ \$40/ton) = \$8,240
- Estimated cost of Insurance (would need to obtain quote –only guesstimate)= \$4,000

Total Estimated Cost for First Year if purchase containers=\$68,600; Estimated yearly after purchase of containers based on assumptions = \$41,400

Total Estimated Savings from current configuration after initial container purchase (does not include per capita allocation)=\$45,000\*

*\*Savings would be more if material cost is less and frequency of pulls is lower. After one year in operation a truer yearly savings can be determined.*

*Does not include advertising cost for marketing of sites, cameras, signage costs, site prep or electricity from lights. Sites maintenance could be performed by the current groups.*



# Next Steps...

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- Choose and work out details for 4 permanent sites for a 2018 pilot study

**Recommended sites –Tontogany/Washington Twp., Milton Twp./Custar, Pemberville, and Portage Twp.**

*(If authorized -Need to determine number of containers and have conversations with the sites to move to permanent)*

- This will allow the District to gauge usage and obtain feedback from the citizens in those areas. If pilot is successful, then expand the locations in 2019.

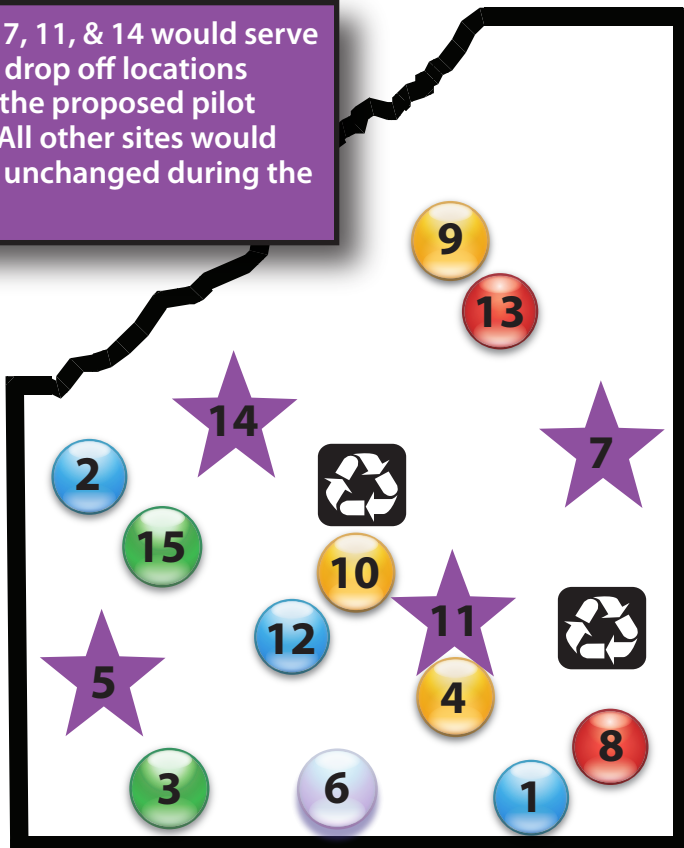

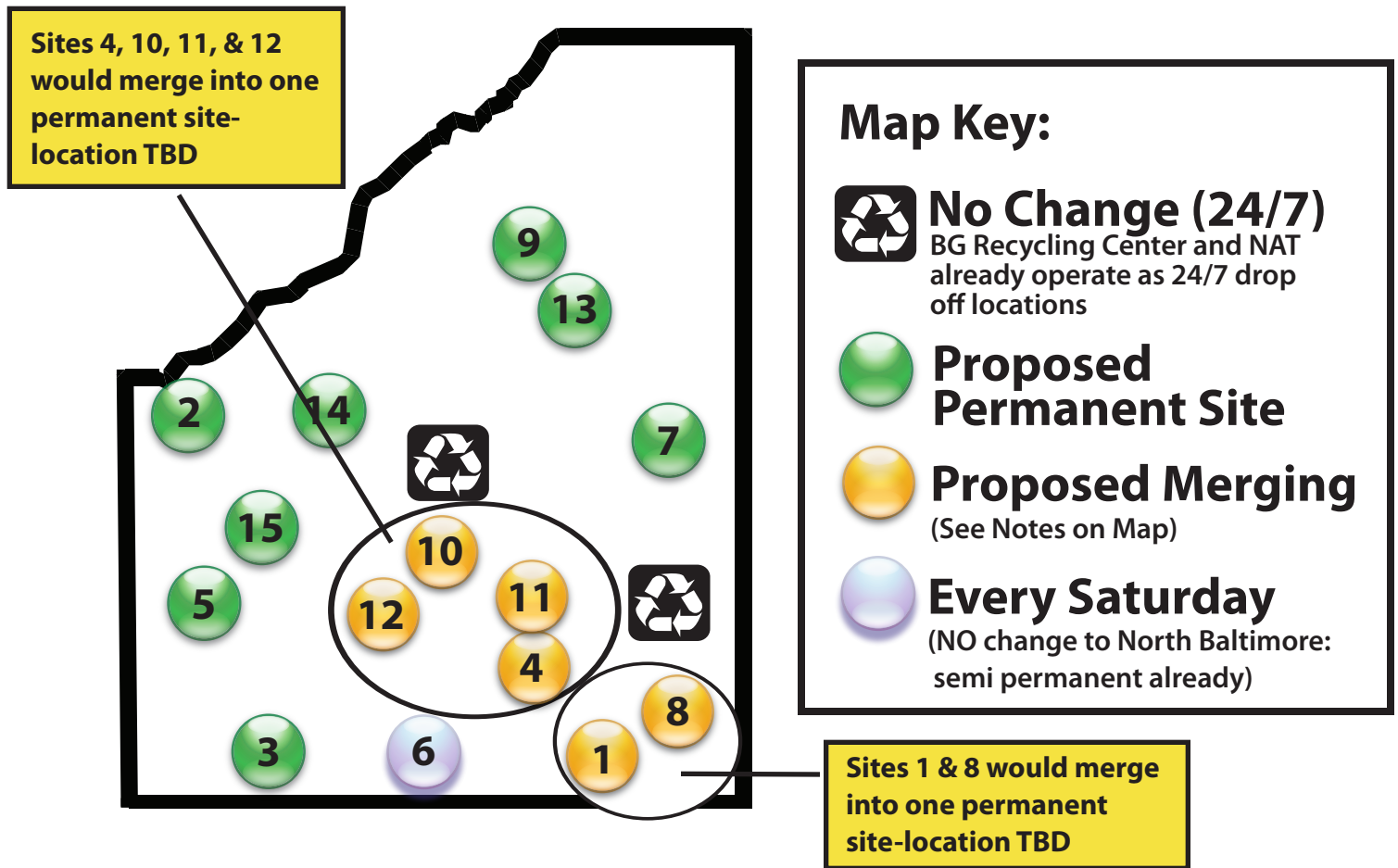

## **Technical Assistance, Education, & Awareness Report: August 14, 2017**

### **A. Education Program Review & Events:**

#### **Past Events:**

- Wood County Employee Safety Fair (6/13)
- Earth Camp (7/27)
- Wood County Fair (7/31-8/7)

### **B. Earth Camp 2017:**

This was the 17<sup>th</sup> year for Earth Camp and one of the biggest! Over 200 K-5<sup>th</sup> graders + 30 adults joined together at William Henry Harrison Park for a day of outdoor learning. Representatives from our office, the City of Perrysburg, the Wood Soil & Water Conservation District, the Wood County Park District and Nature's Nursery provided lessons throughout the day.

### **C. 2017 Wood County Fair:**

**Recycling:** District staff partnered with the Wood County Fair Board, Phoenix Technologies and the Wood County Sheriff's Office to provide recycling during this year's Wood County Fair.

**The Grove:** The District displayed in the natural resources area located to the north of the Grandstands once again this year! We joined our colleagues from the Wood County Park District, the Wood Soil and Water Conservation District, the OSU Extension, and the Wood County Historical Society.

### **D. GOT YOUR BAGS?**

The District continued to promote the "GOT YOUR BAGS?" message at the Wood County Fair through a display and promotional items. We have been working with Bowling Green Chamber of Commerce to get this information out to local businesses-information was provided during a Chamber Meeting and the display was posted at the Chamber Office for a couple of weeks. We are going to reach out to the Farmer's Markets to offer to provide reusable bags and get the word out about our campaign.

### **E. HHR One Page Directory:**

The full Household Recycling Guide (booklet) has been replaced with a one page/two sided color brochure. The full guide is still available on the website and updated as needed. The guide was becoming out of date as soon as it was printed due to changes. This will provide more current information to our residents in a more cost effective way. A copy has been included with this report.

### **F. 2017 Education Numbers (Through July 1):**

As of July 1<sup>st</sup>, the District has provided 30 tours and 53 presentations. We've also participated in 11 community events. The website has been visited approximately 10K times by 7K users. 54% are mobile users. The top pages are: Landfill; Household Recycling Options; & Yard Waste.
